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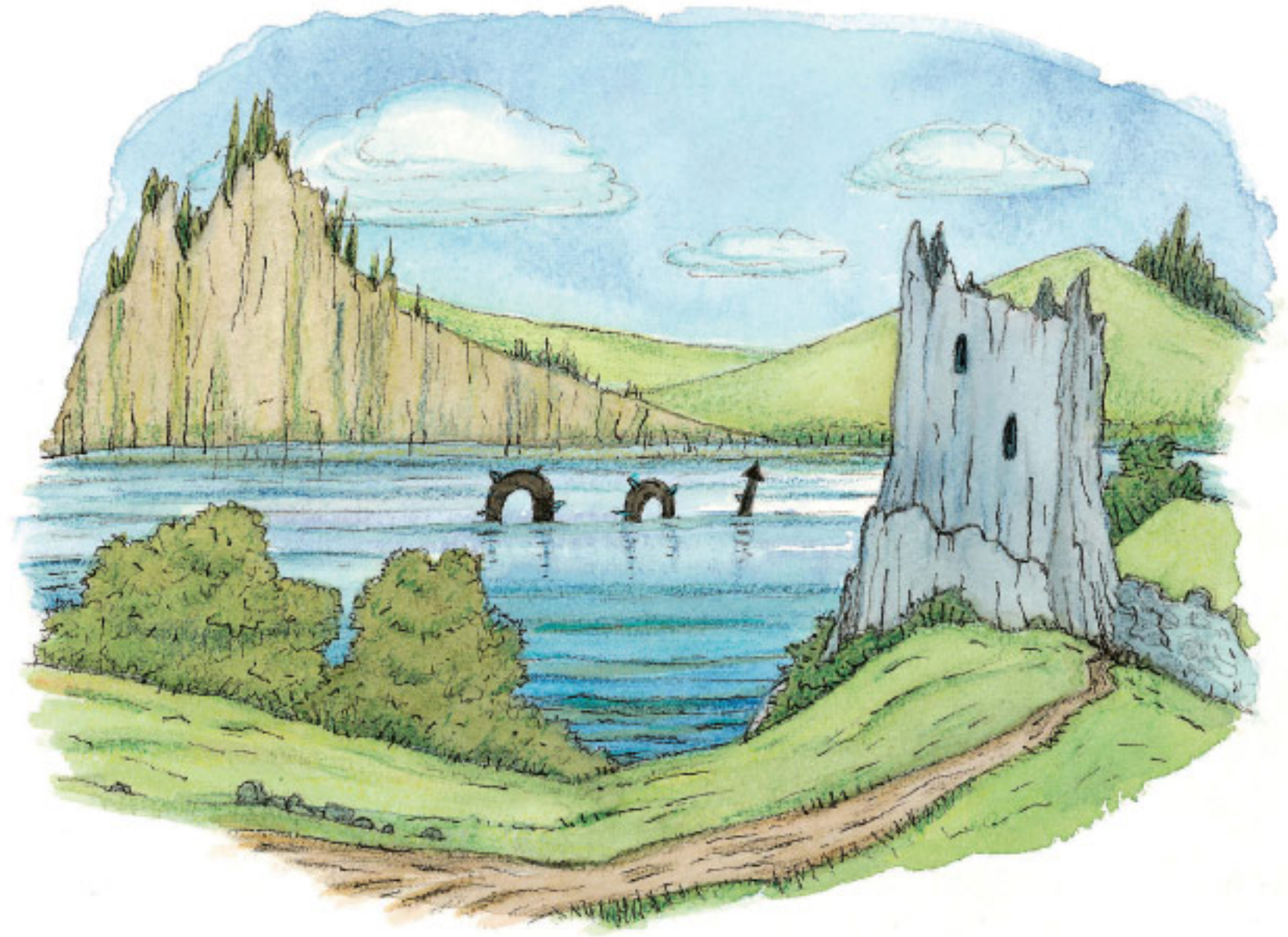

of Loch Ness there lived not one . . .

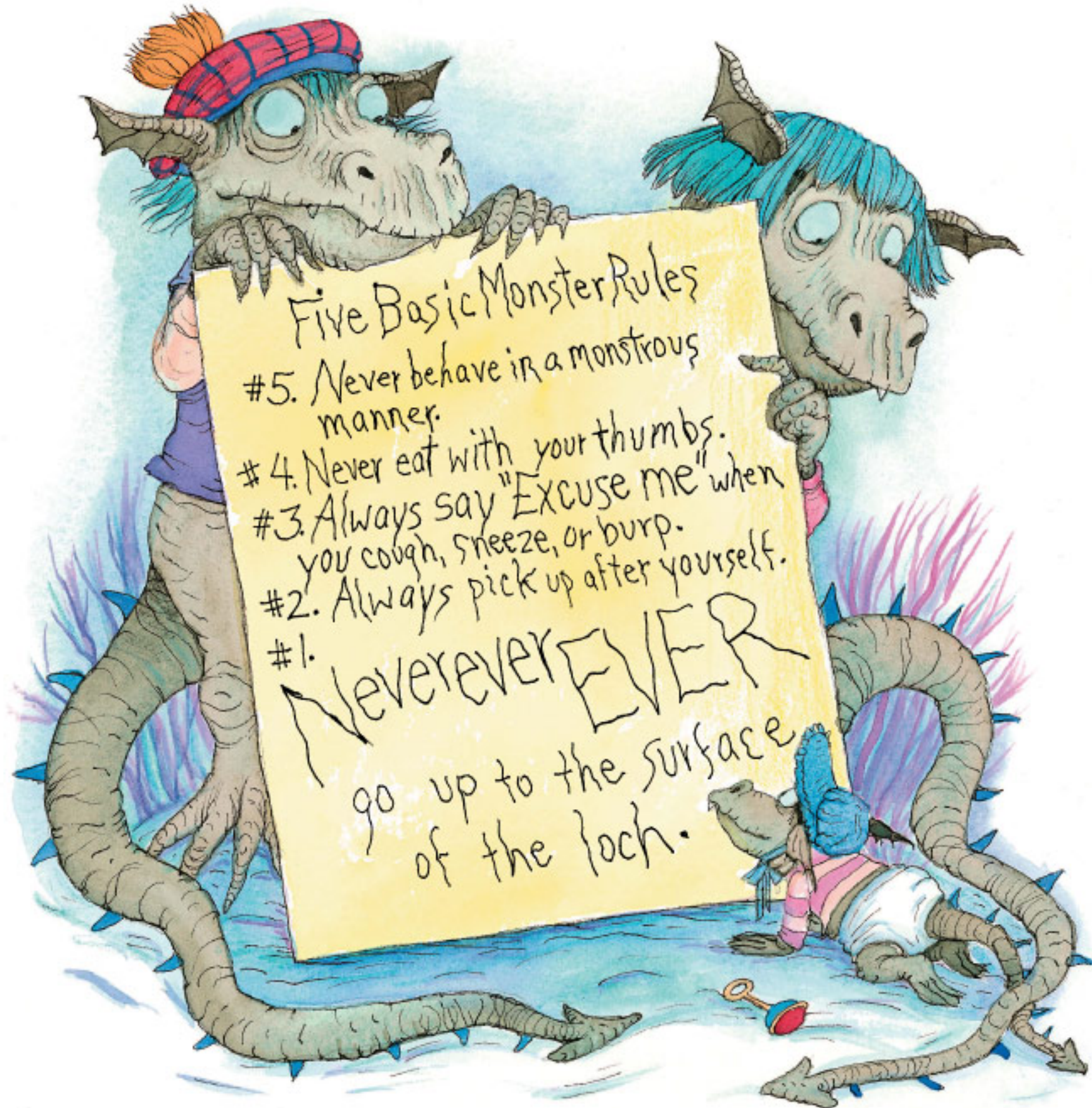
but *three* monsters!
