It'll help you hunt other animals for food.



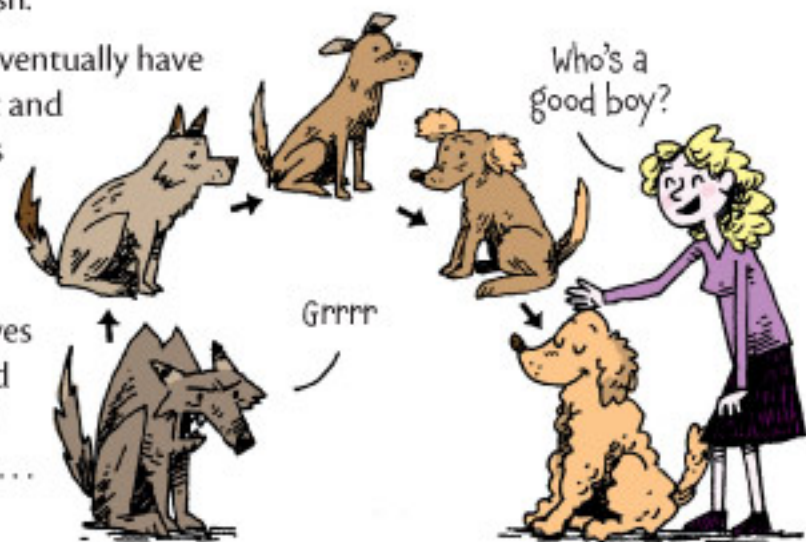
And if the evening's chilly it'll let you snuggle up to it to keep warm.
