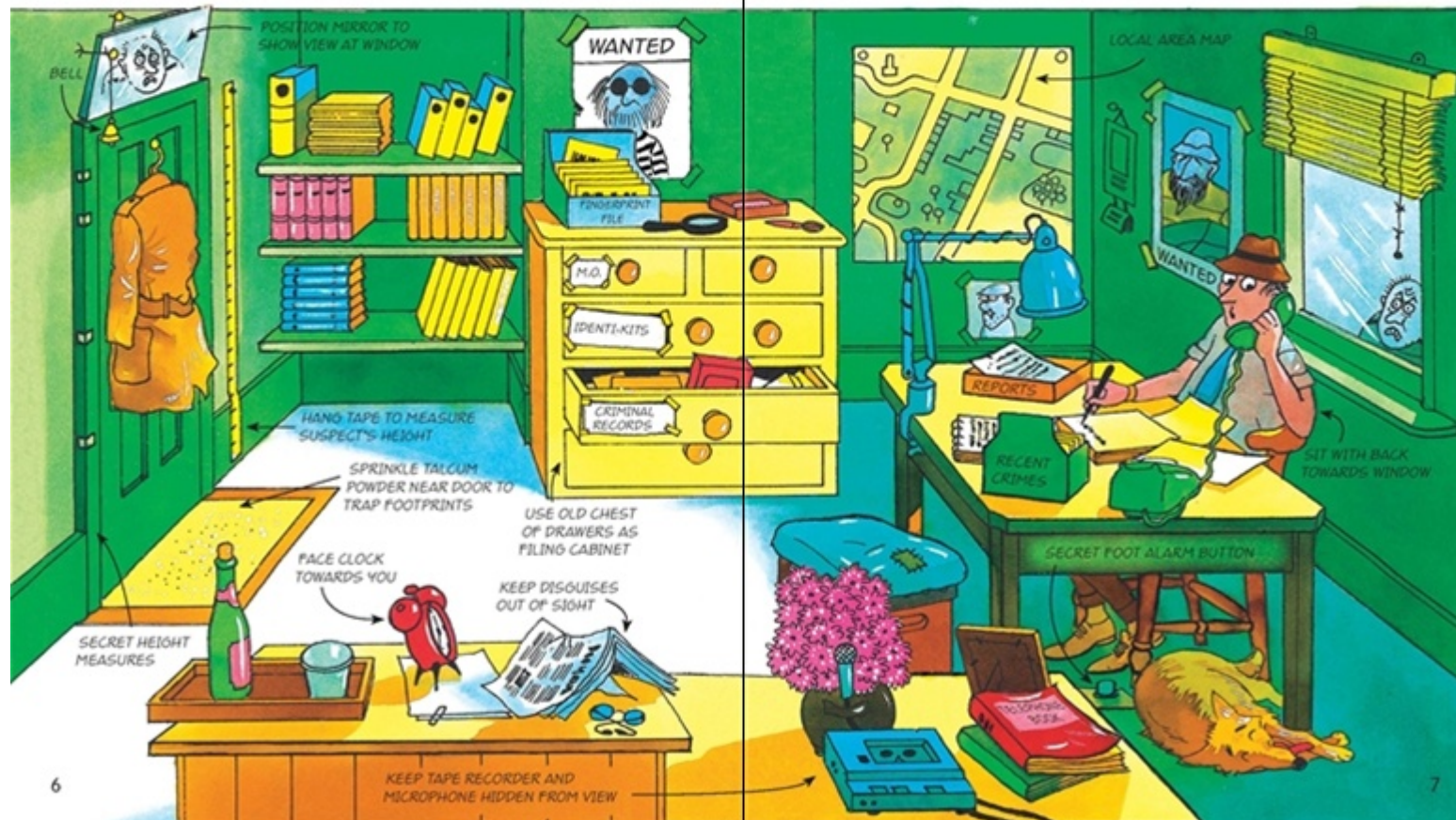

## Setting up an office

Before you can do any detective work, you need an office to work from. Here you can store your detective gear and set up crafty traps for crooks. Some may help you to guess if a suspect is innocent or guilty. Look at Detective Dodd's office to get some tips.

Sit with your back to the window, so when you question a suspect, you can see their face. Hang something above the door which makes a noise when the door is opened. Make sure you can also see if anything is going on behind you.
