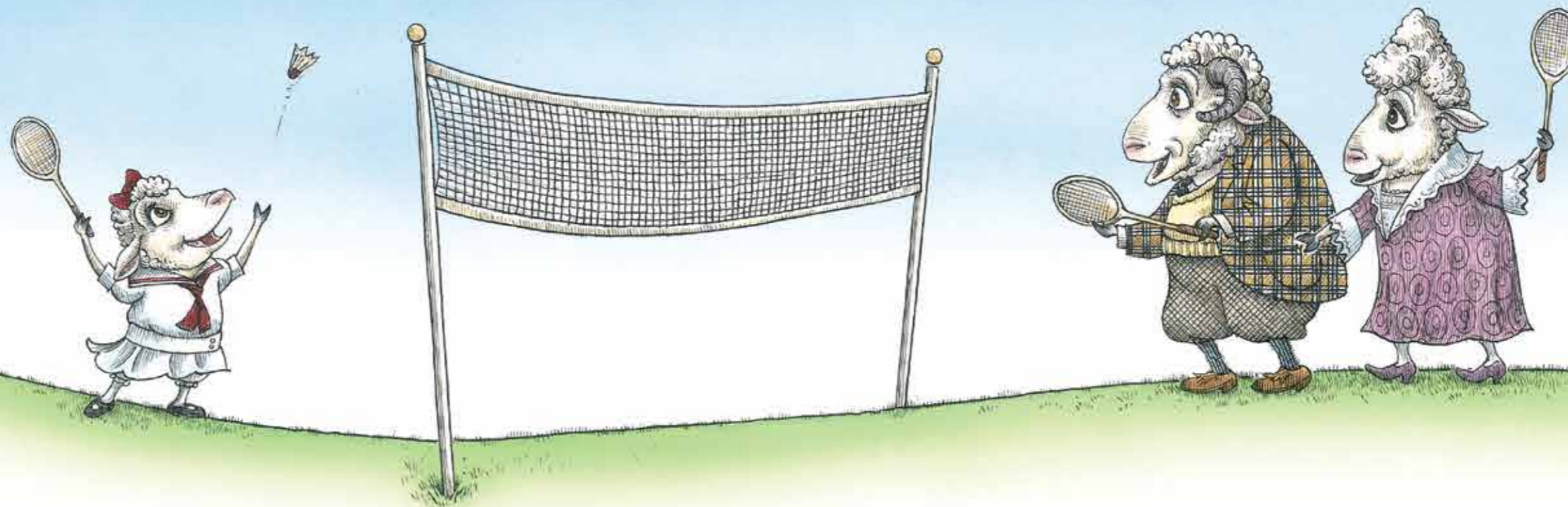

**Once upon a time** there lived a family of sheep.

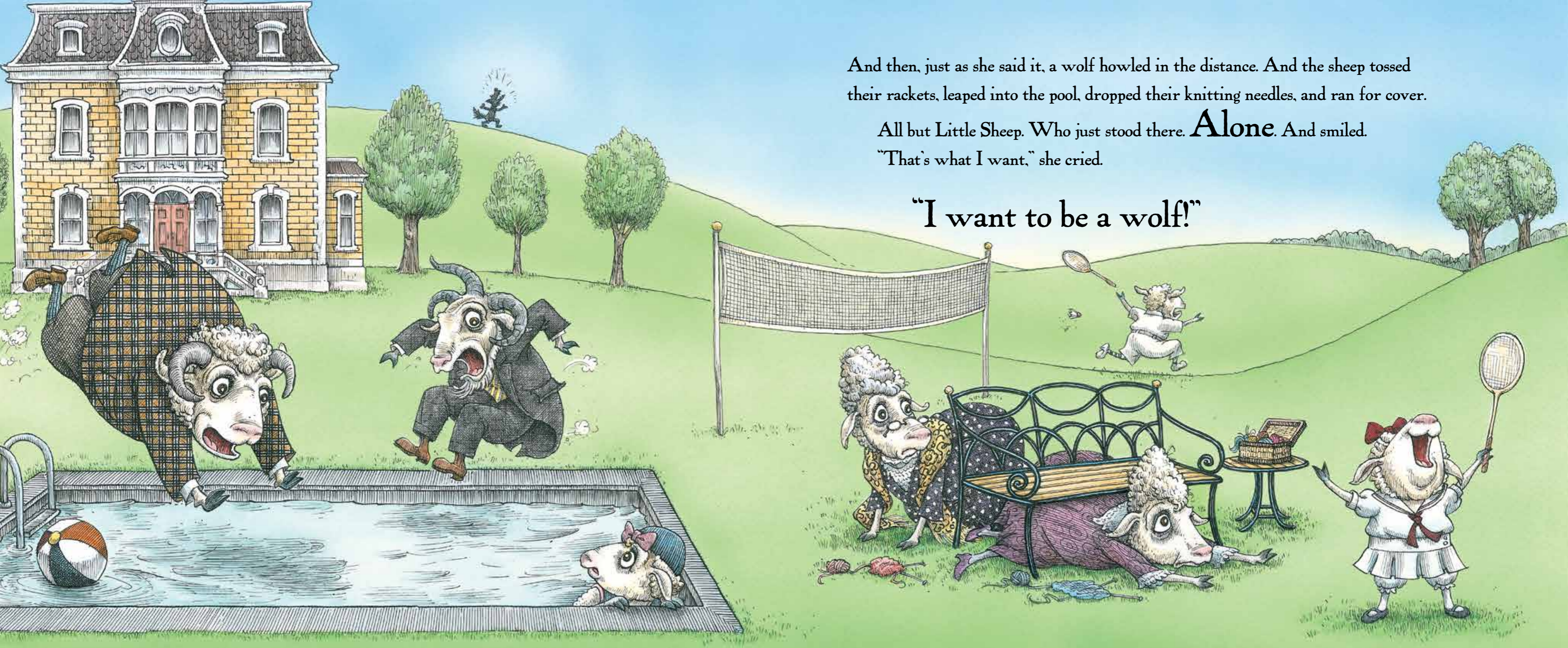
They grazed on grass, crunched on clover, and played on green pastures.
