Help Dave* to have an extremely memorable trip to the bog.**

You need: Clingfilm A toilet Dave -

Dead Finger


Make Dave scream as you show him your chopped-off moving finger in a matchbox!

You need:

A small empty matchbox Scissors Cotton wool Ketchup (or something red – not actual blood!) Talcum powder Dave

How to do it:

Remove the inside tray of the matchbox and cut a finger-sized hole towards one end using the scissors.







Shove your finger through the hole so it sits inside the tray. Then surround your finger with cotton wool and talcum powder it so it looks dead.

Squeeze a bit of ketchup round the bottom of your finger, then slide the matchbox cover back over the tray. Bosh! You now have a dead finger in a matchbox.
