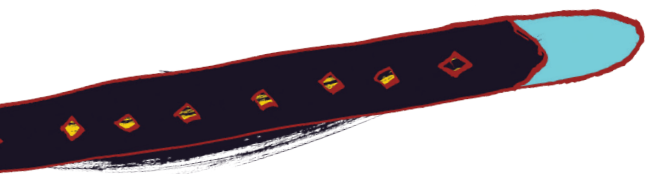

Norman the Norman from Normandy woke up with a big yawn and rolled over.

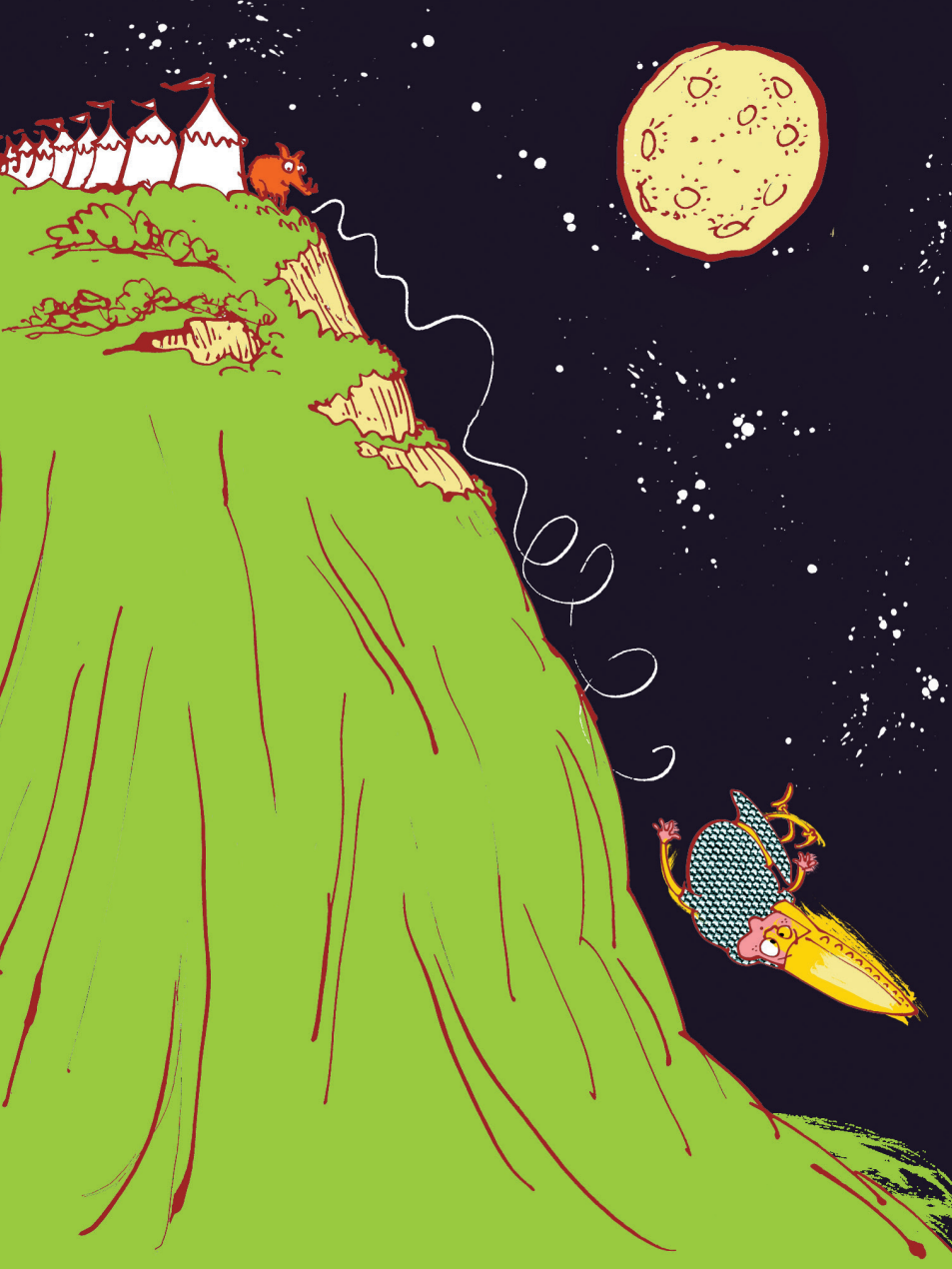
He kept rolling over and over and over and over. You get the picture.
