# Born to Build

Each story in this book is true. They are stories of incredible animal architects; animals that, just like us, were born to build.



We are the **Tailorbirds.**  
The needle-beaked nesters.

The female is the one who builds, while the male keeps guard. We don't want any other tailorbirds stealing our spot!

To make the nest, we poke holes along the edge of a large leaf.

Next we sew it together to make a cone.  
Now, what in a forest would make a good sewing thread...?

We choose spiderweb or plant fibres.

Inside the leaf, we weave a delicate cup of grass, softened with cotton, feathers and fur.

We lay our precious eggs.

We are so careful with our sewing that the leaf stays alive and green - the perfect camouflage to keep our chicks hidden.





We are the **Weaver Birds.**

The clever-beak and nimble-foot birds.

We thread strands of grass  
to make our hanging homes;  
a high, safe space to raise our  
chicks, where it is difficult  
for predators to reach.

It is the male birds who build the nests.
