“No time for breakfast – we have a very busy day ahead,” I said, pushing them out the door.

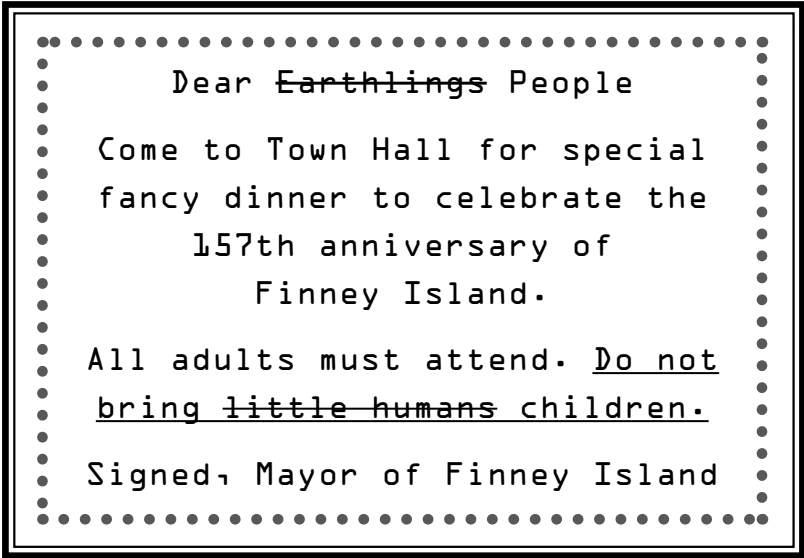
