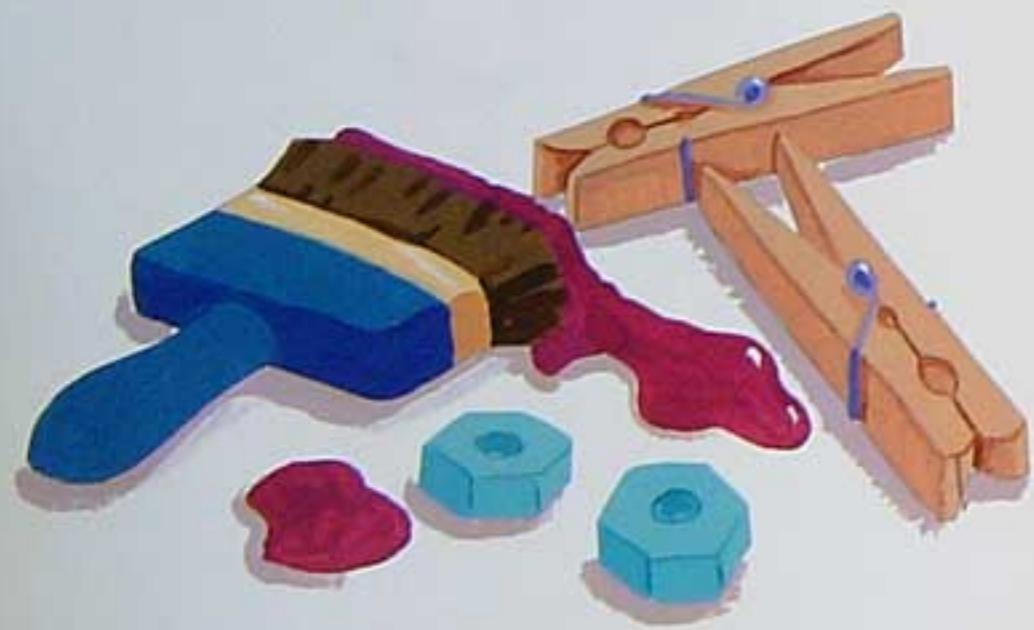

on her box.



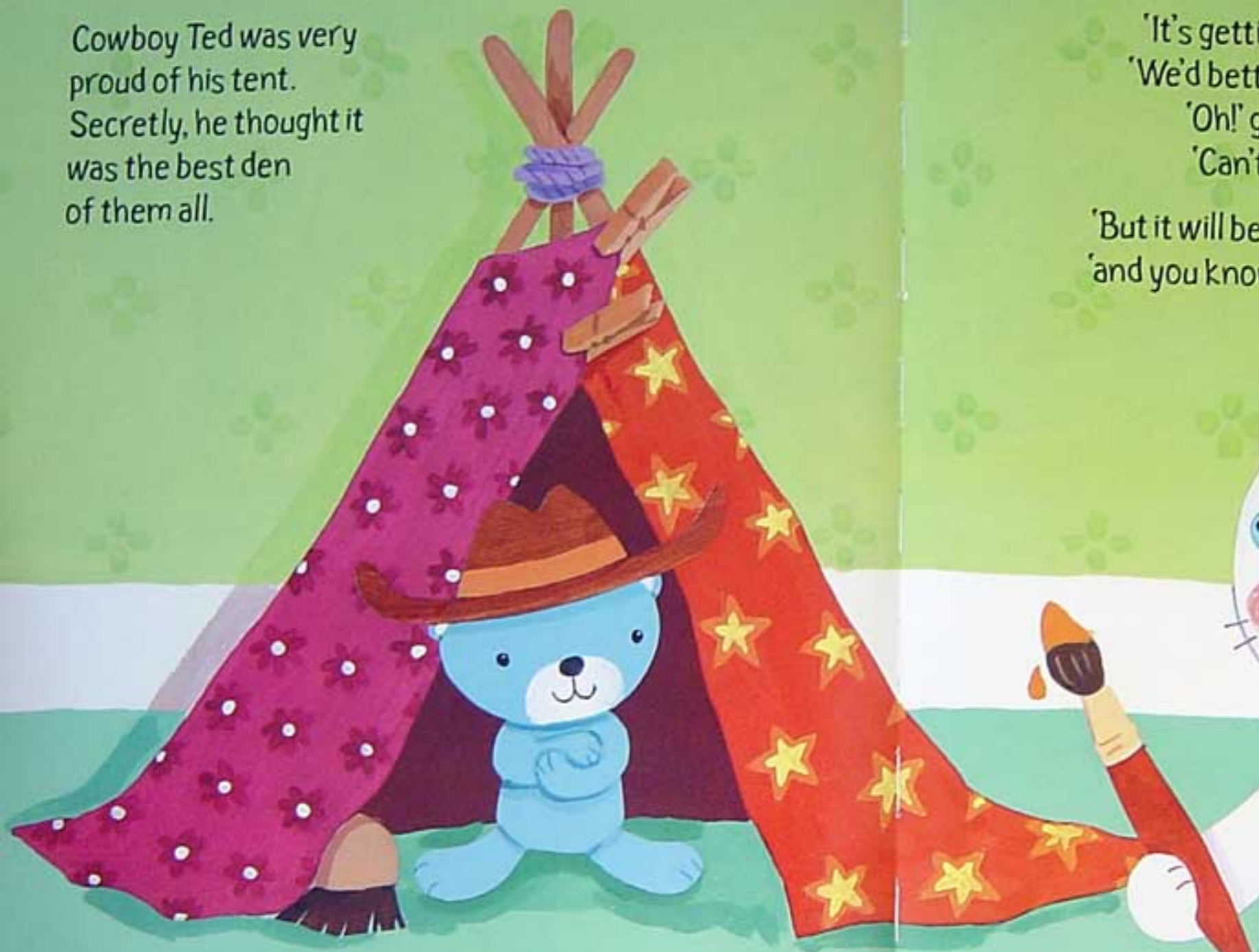
'Amazing!'
