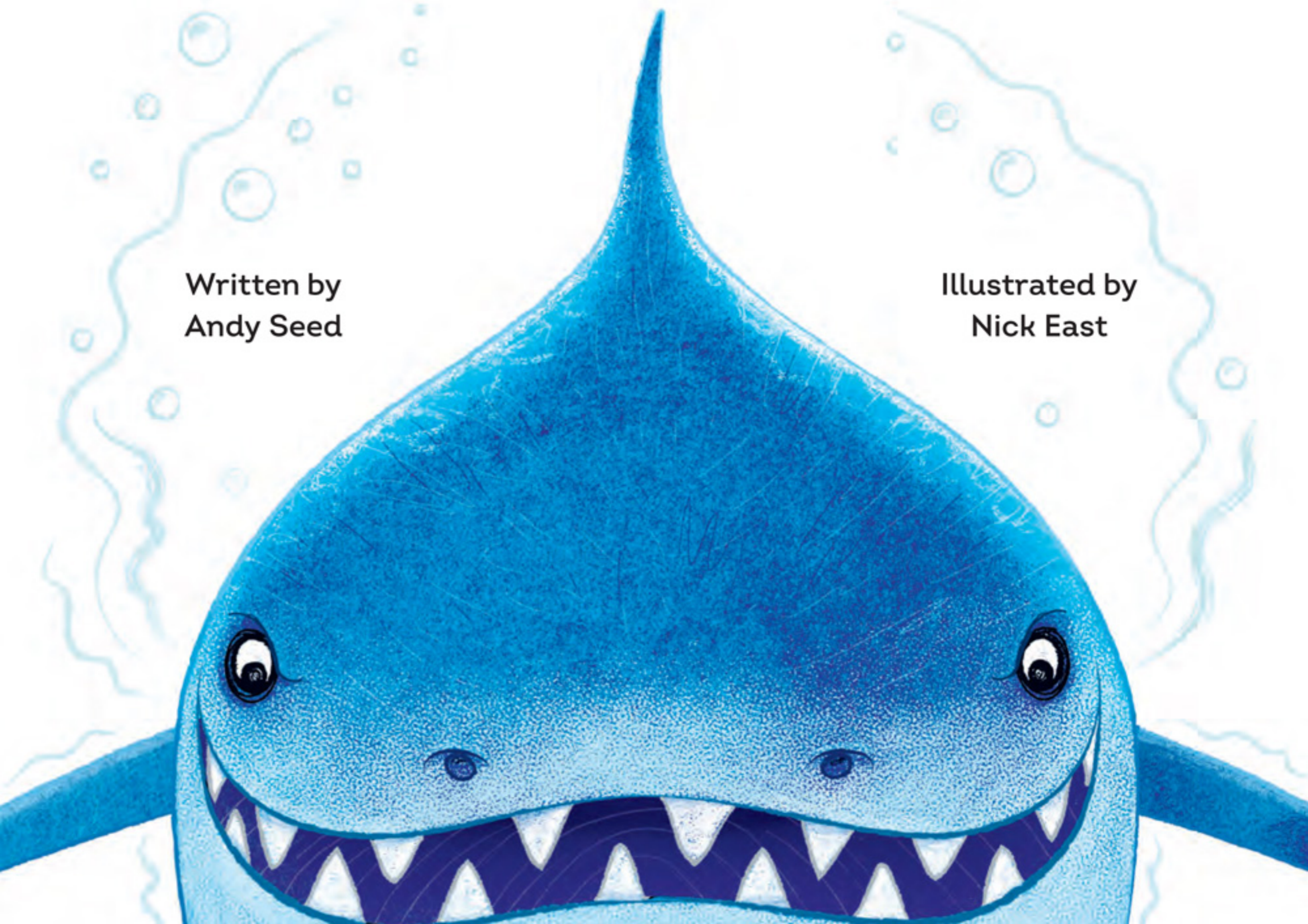


# Interview

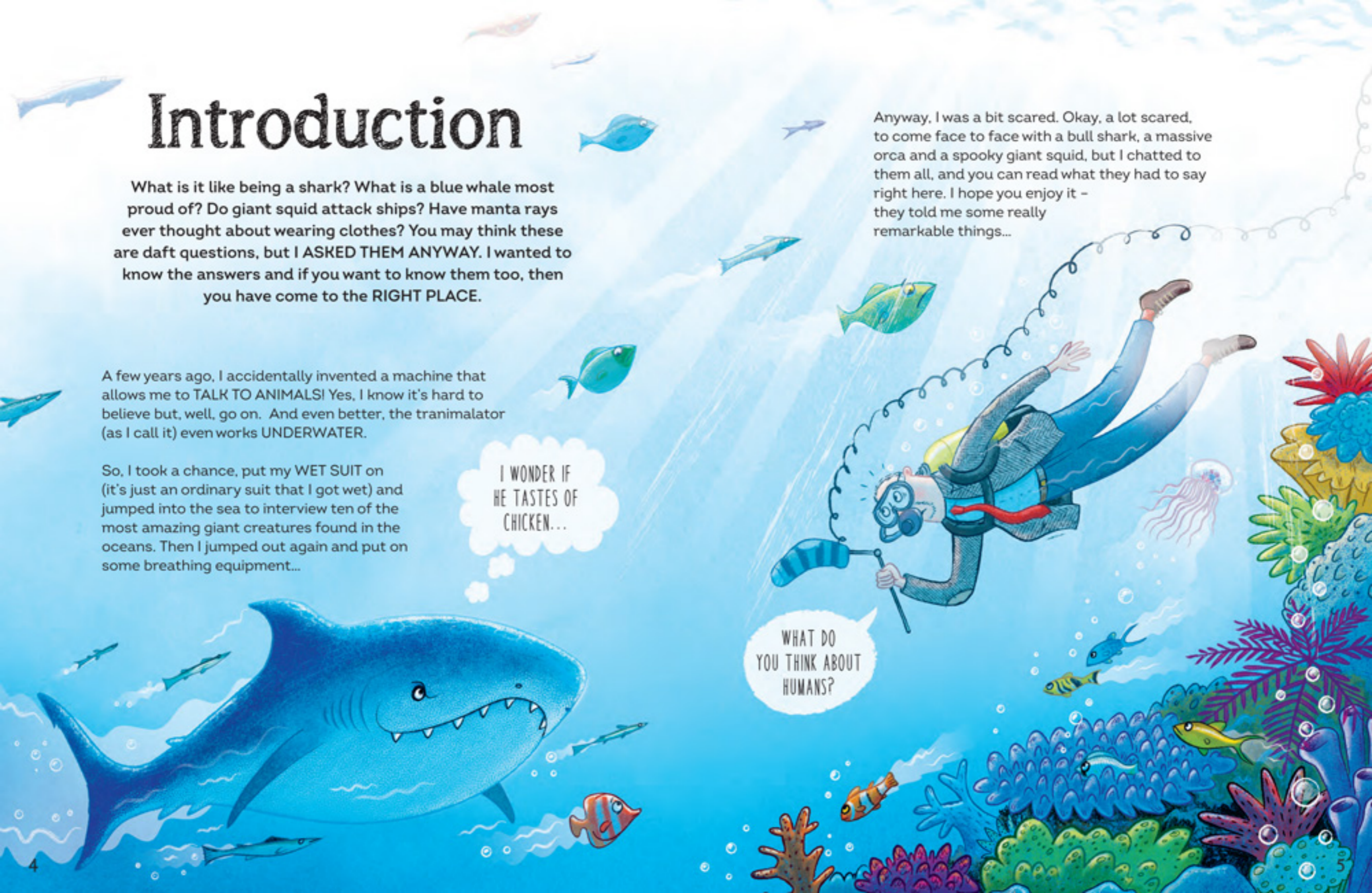

**Q: Why not in the deep sea?**

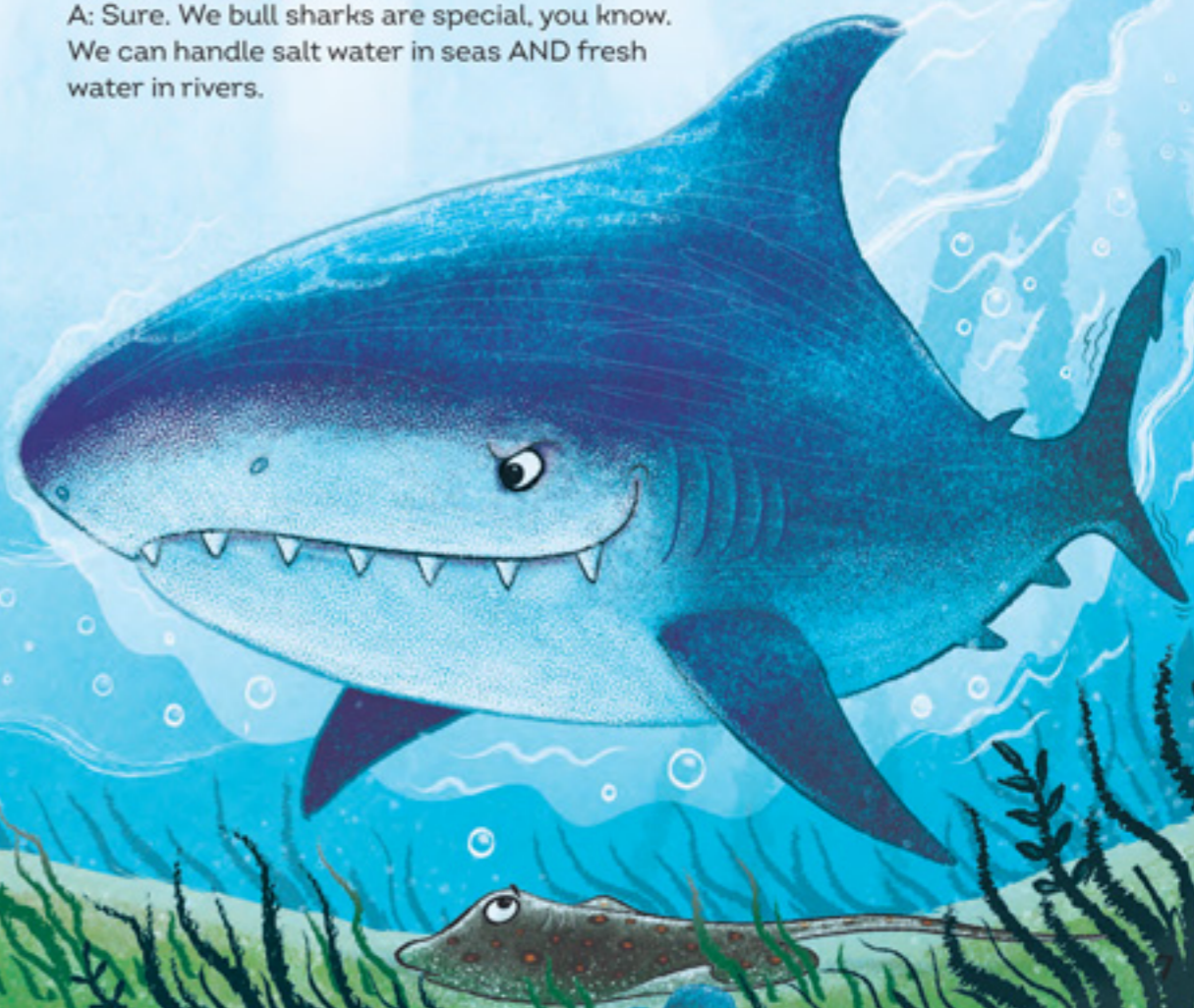
A: Well, for a start, Mr Annoying, there are plenty of fish to eat in shallow water and second, it means we are nearer to rivers.
