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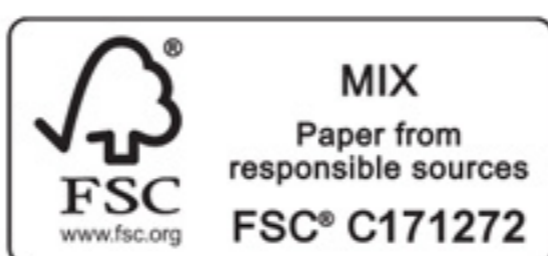

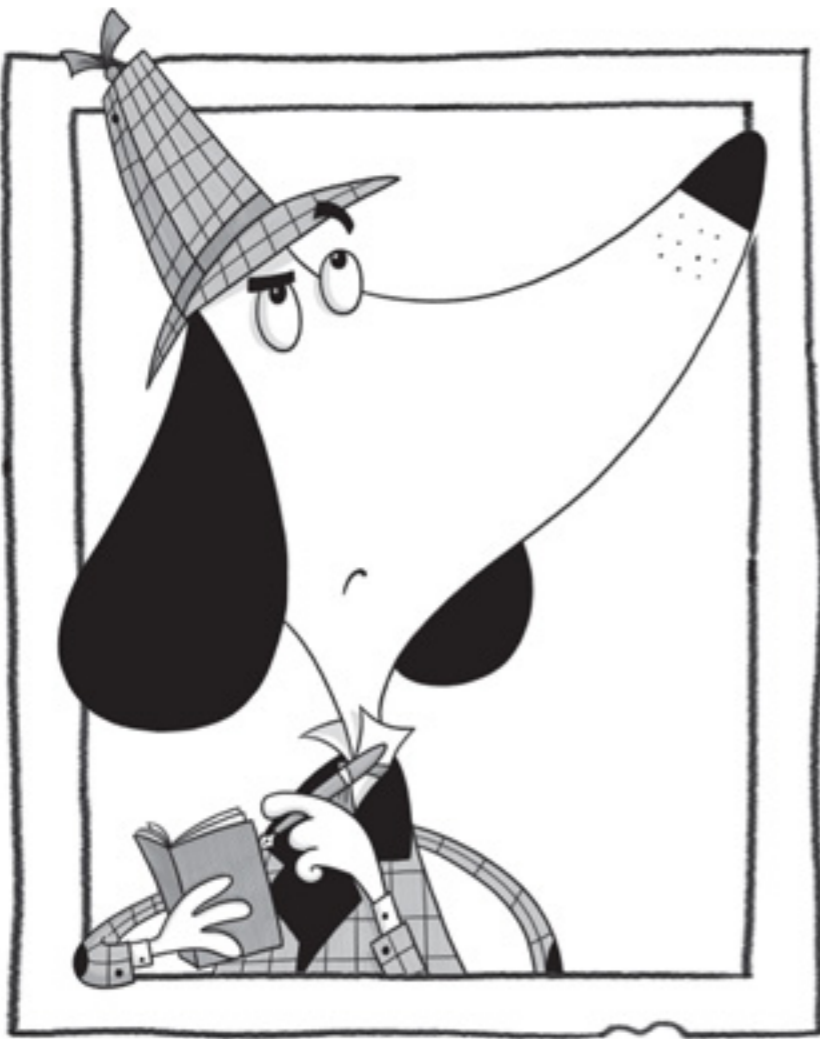

Can you work out which story has caught Catson's attention? The letters in the word finder puzzle below can be rearranged to spell a word that will give you a clue.

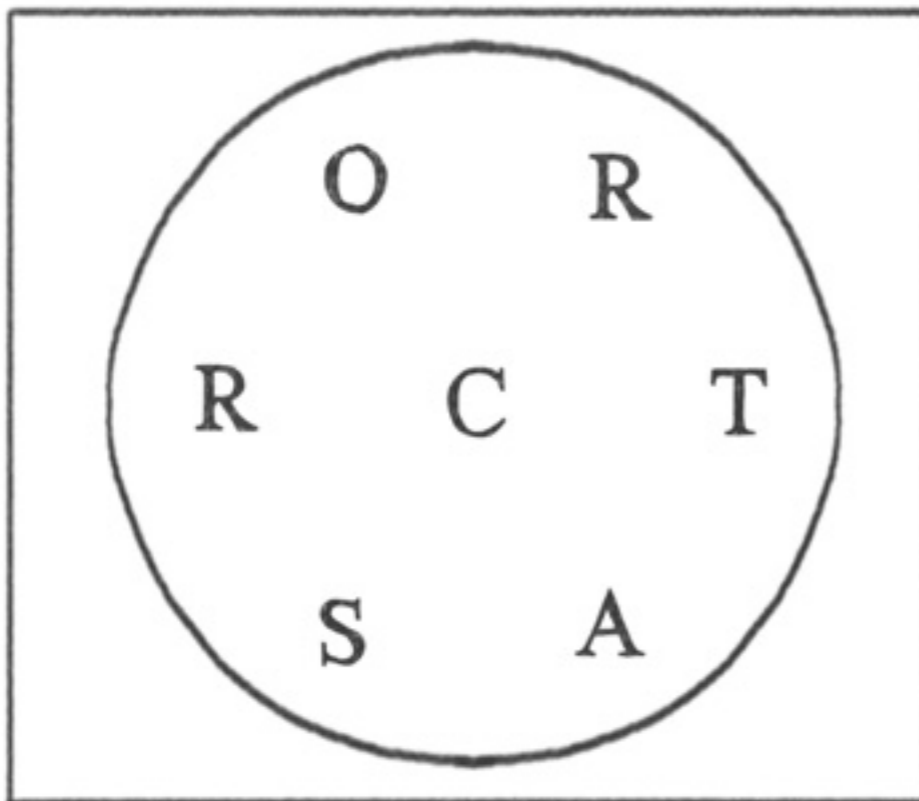

PRICELESS HEIRLOOM STOLEN

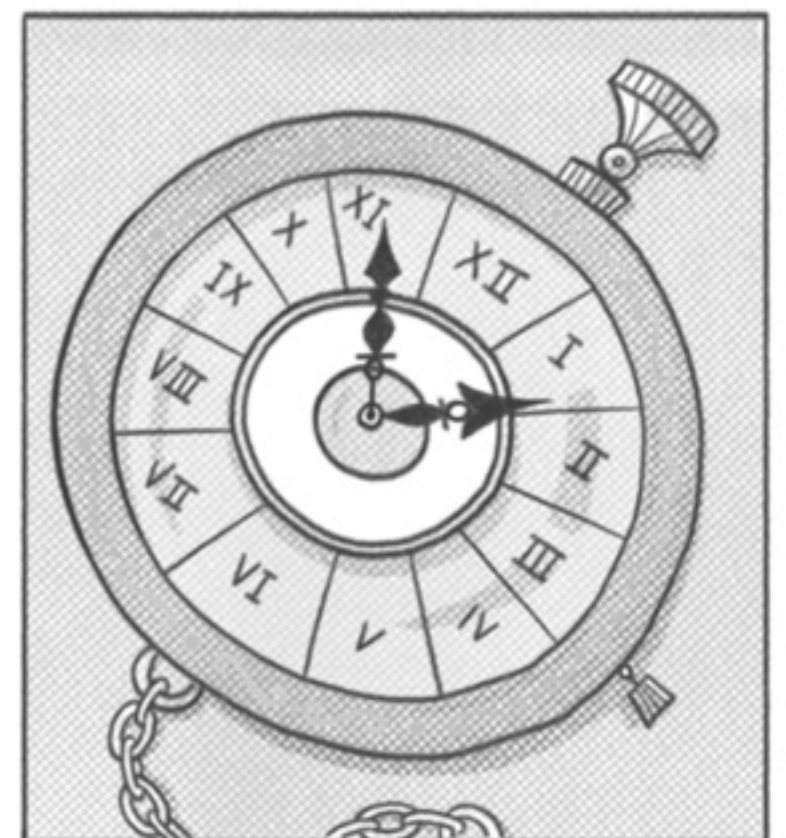

The weather will turn cooler in the afternoon, and by evening, a fog will sweep in, so take extra care if you're venturing out.

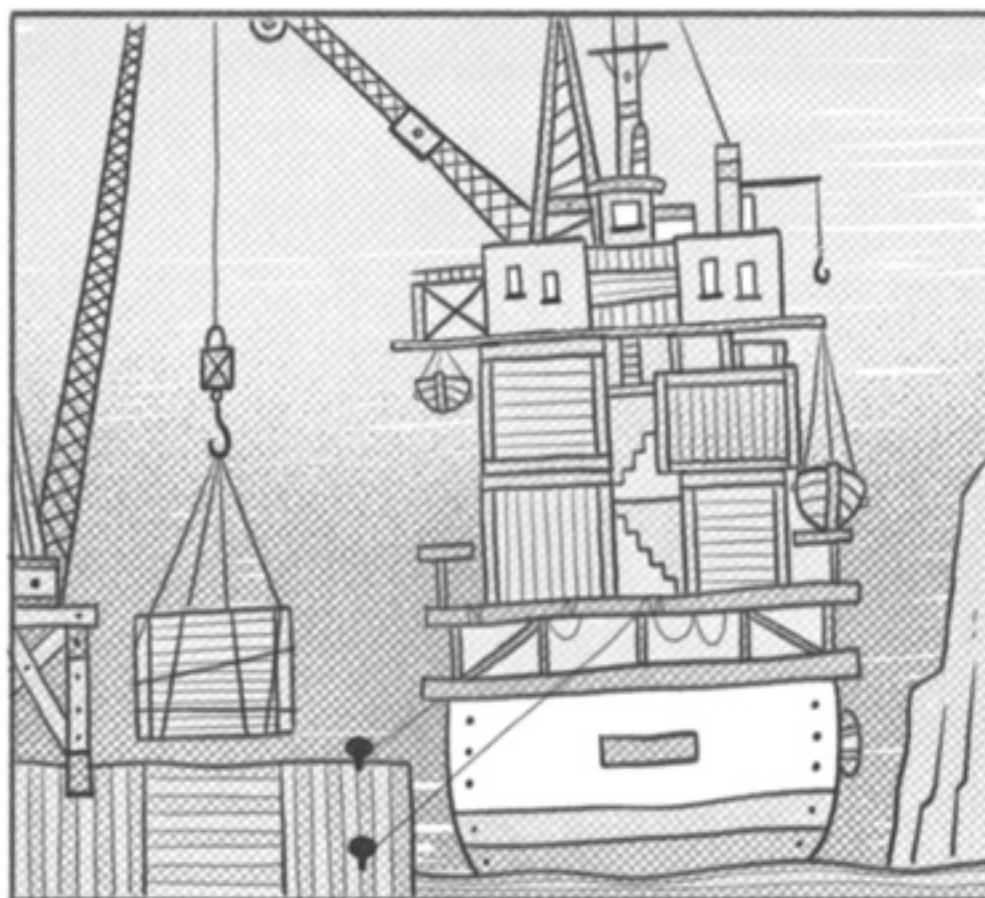
Tomorrow will bring more hot weather, so it is recommended that you keep your windows open at night.

LOCAL MOLE HAS RECORD-BREAKING COLLECTION

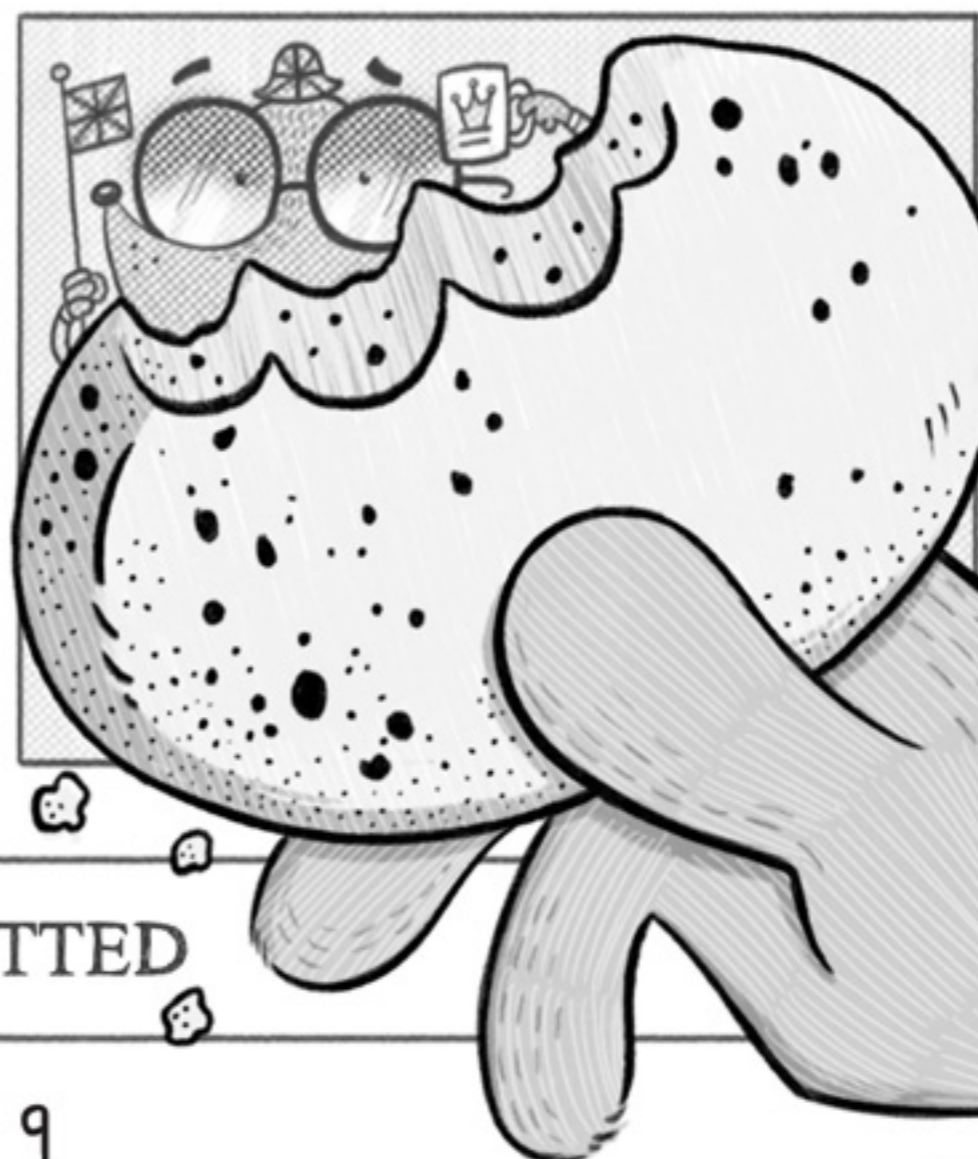
