
GODFREY

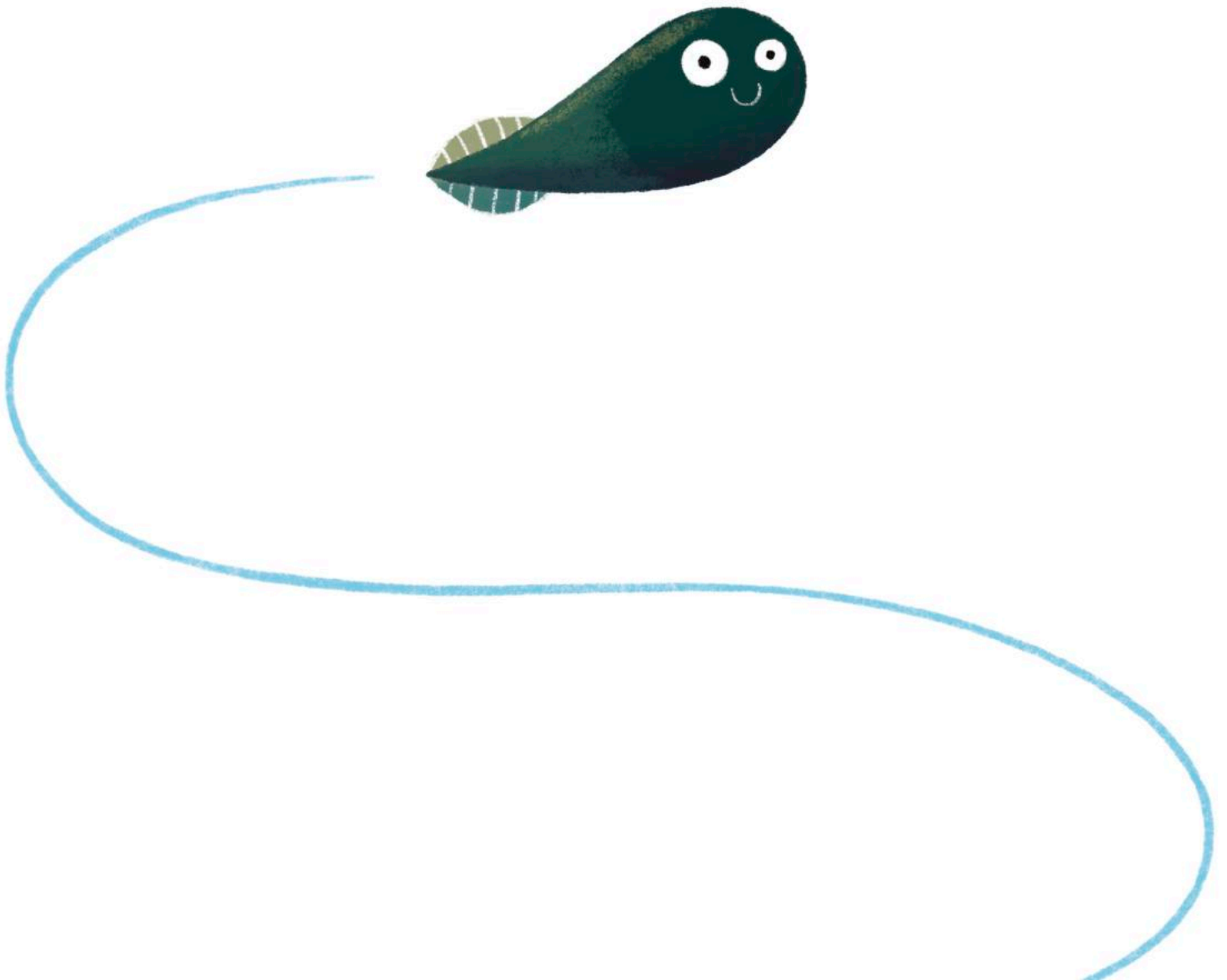


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At first, Godfrey is just an

bright eyes.

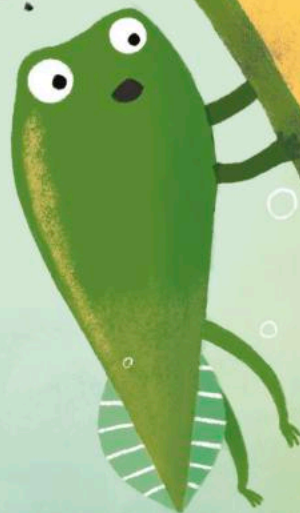


A few days later,

cool!

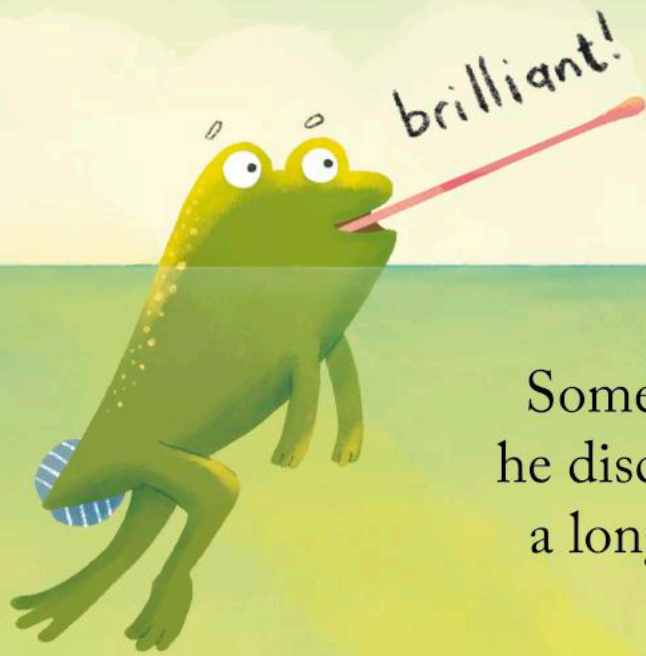


Wow!
