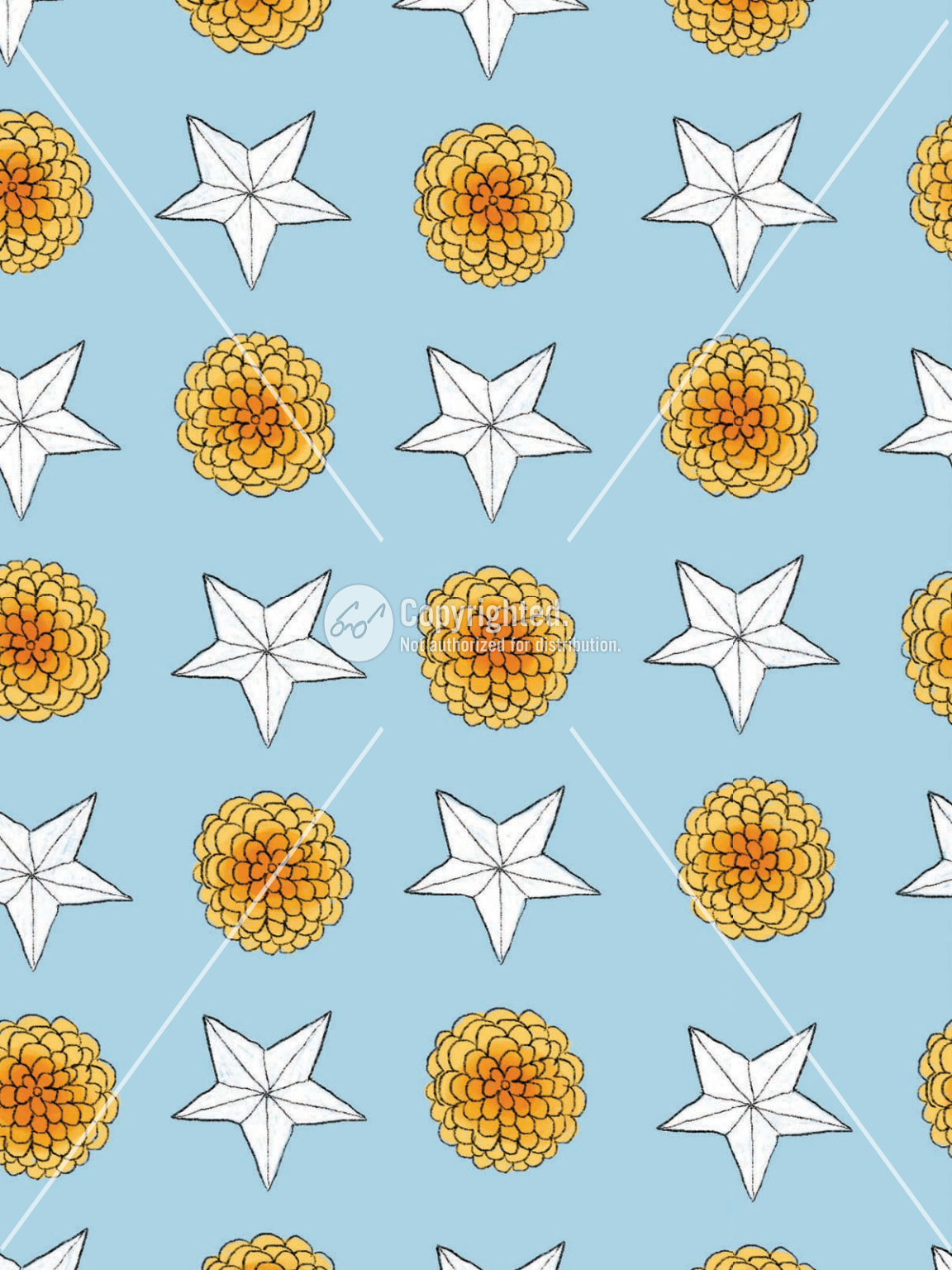

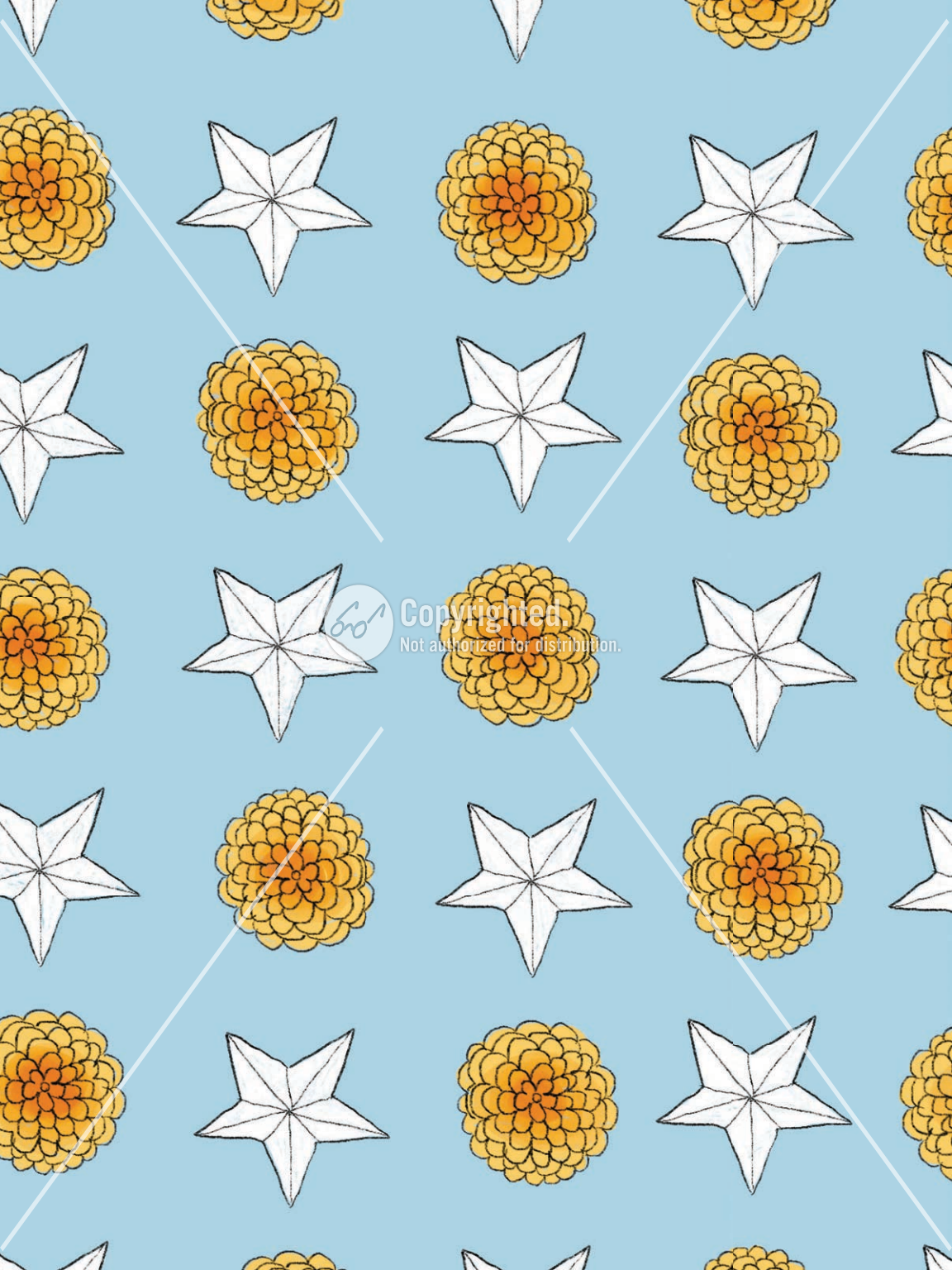

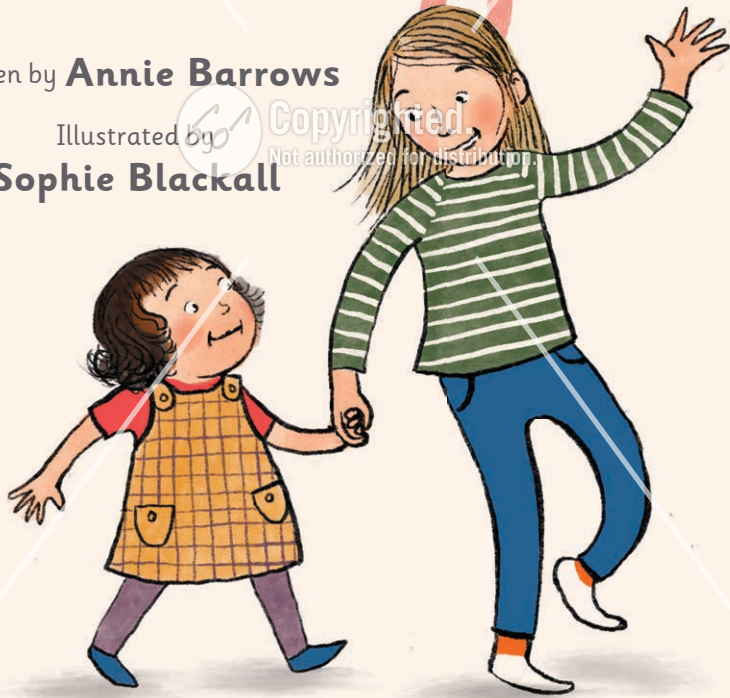

It's hard being a baby. Everyone knows more than you do. But from that moment on, Marigold knew one thing for sure: Stella.



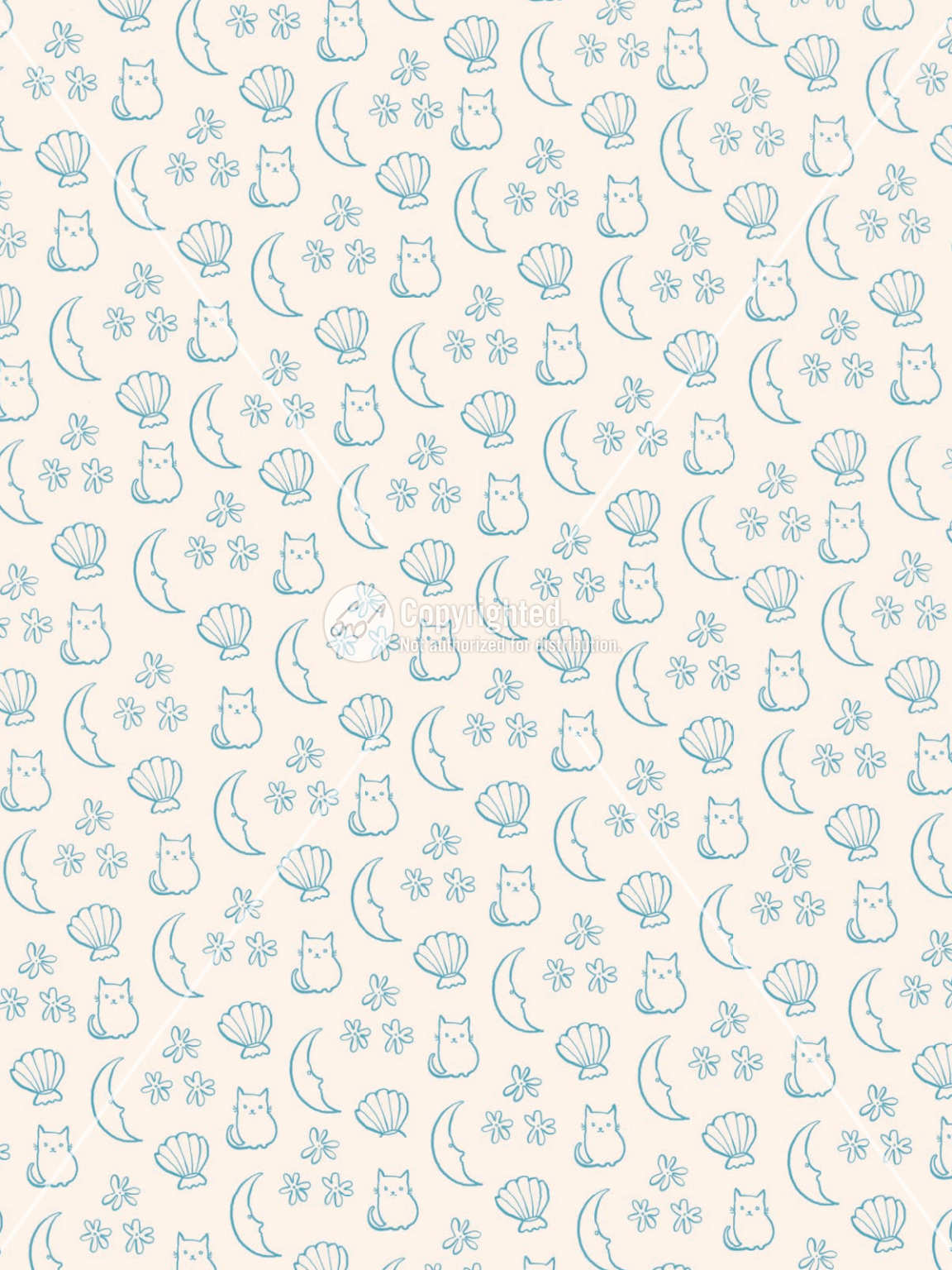
