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FOREWORD

Once upon a time, two talented, imaginative people—author/illustrator Tony DiTerlizzi and writer Holly Black—received a letter from three children who claimed they had seen faeries. Whether this was true or not

didn't matter—Tony and Holly, who once shared a passion for the game Dungeons and Dragons, were intrigued.

The letter-writers were Jared Grace; his twin brother, Simon; and their older sister, Mallory. Tony and Holly visited them in Maine, and were shown "faerie artifacts"

as the kids told stories about what they had witnessed. The idea that these modern-day children were having adventures with faerie-tale characters fascinated Holly and Tony, and they turned the stories—with some changes and enhancements—into the wonderful five-book series, the Spiderwick Chronicles.

The books were a huge success, their small size and antique design attracting many readers of all ages, as did the unique stories, which combine modern-day kids dealing with realistic family problems and

a fantasy world that is based on centuries-old faerie folklore. Along with the success of the series came the idea for a movie based on the books. The challenge was to combine parts of all five books into one



satisfying and visually appealing story!

The *Spiderwick Chronicles* is a movie about discovery—characters who discover an unseen, fantastical world and, at the same time, discover their family. It's a story about real kids who have to figure out how to battle trolls, ogres, and goblins. It's a journey that, in the end, brings a family together.

On the following pages readers will have a look behind the scenes and meet the dedicated people and production teams responsible for the creation of this wondrous movie.

In the early planning stages the idea was for the movie to tell just two of the five books in the Spiderwick Chronicles series because five felt like "too much for one movie," said Karey Kirkpatrick, one of the producers, who also cowrote the screenplay with John Sayles. However, because the five books told a complete story arc, it was decided that the movie needed to be adapted from all of them. "I think the challenge for the actors when you have a wealth of imaginative and great things to choose from is which ones you have to pull out," Karey added.

"That's always the painful part."
