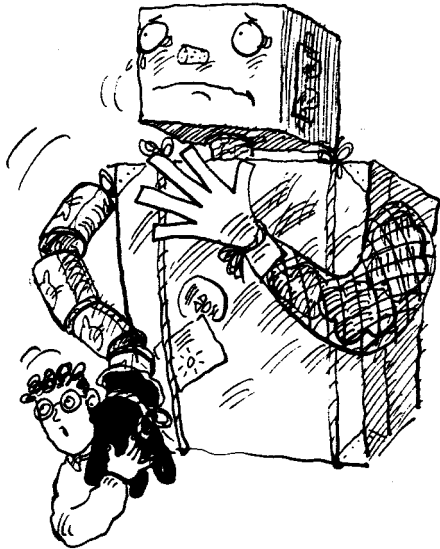

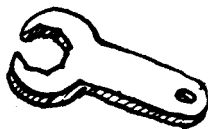

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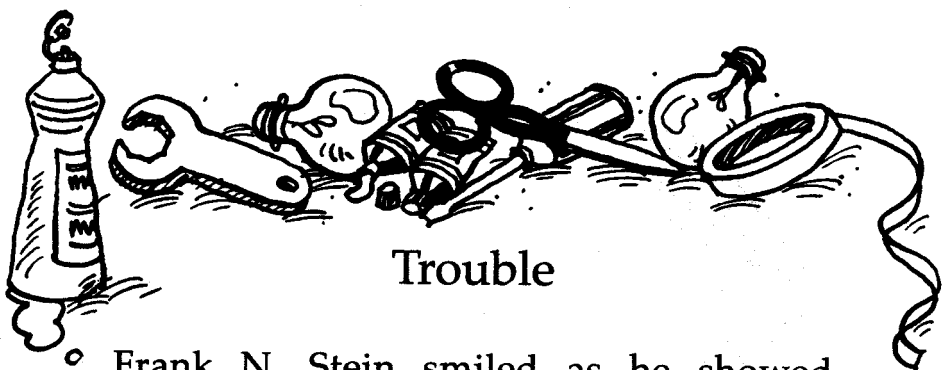
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Trouble

Each day a huge lorry arrived to collect the monster and take him off to work. Frank would stand at the front gate and wave, then he would set off for school.

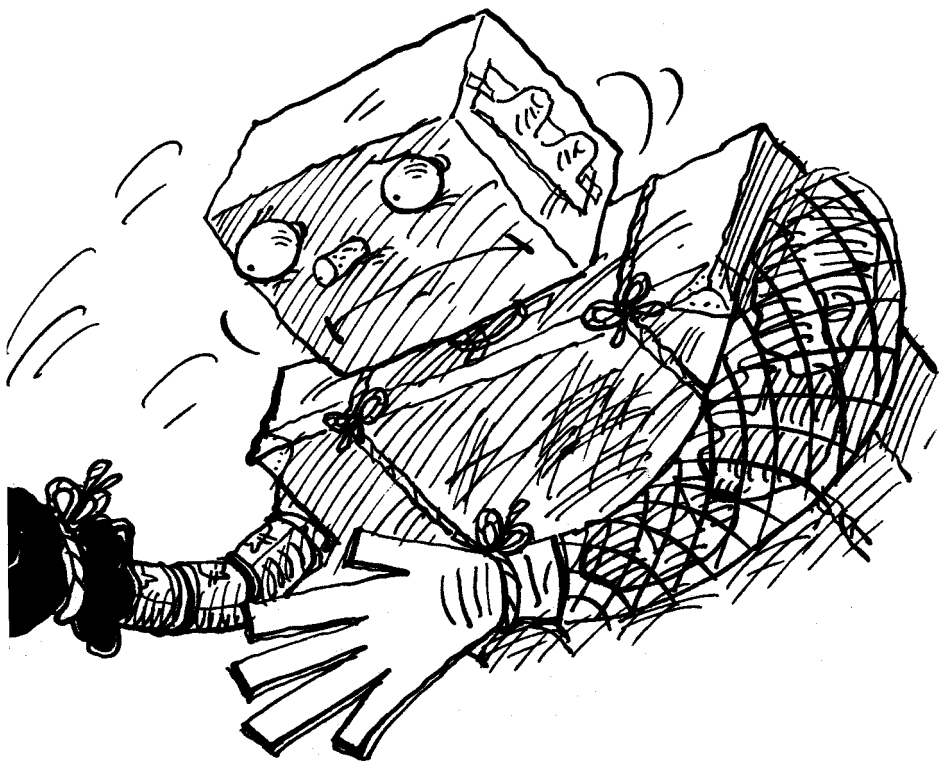
Each evening Frank would wait by the gate until the monster came home. As the monster was driven back down the road, people would lean out of their windows to welcome him back.
