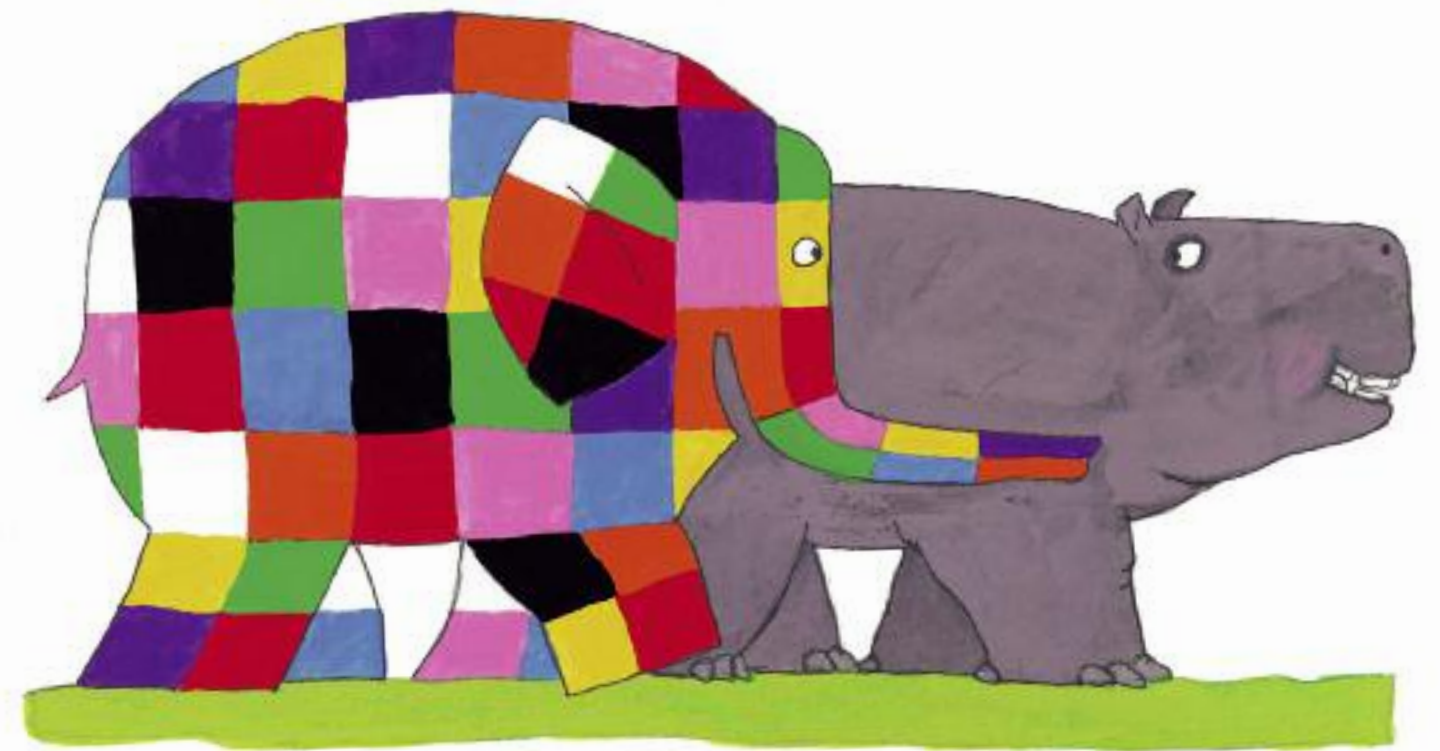

Elmer, the patchwork elephant, was having a friendly chat with Lion and Tiger when three angry elephants came by.

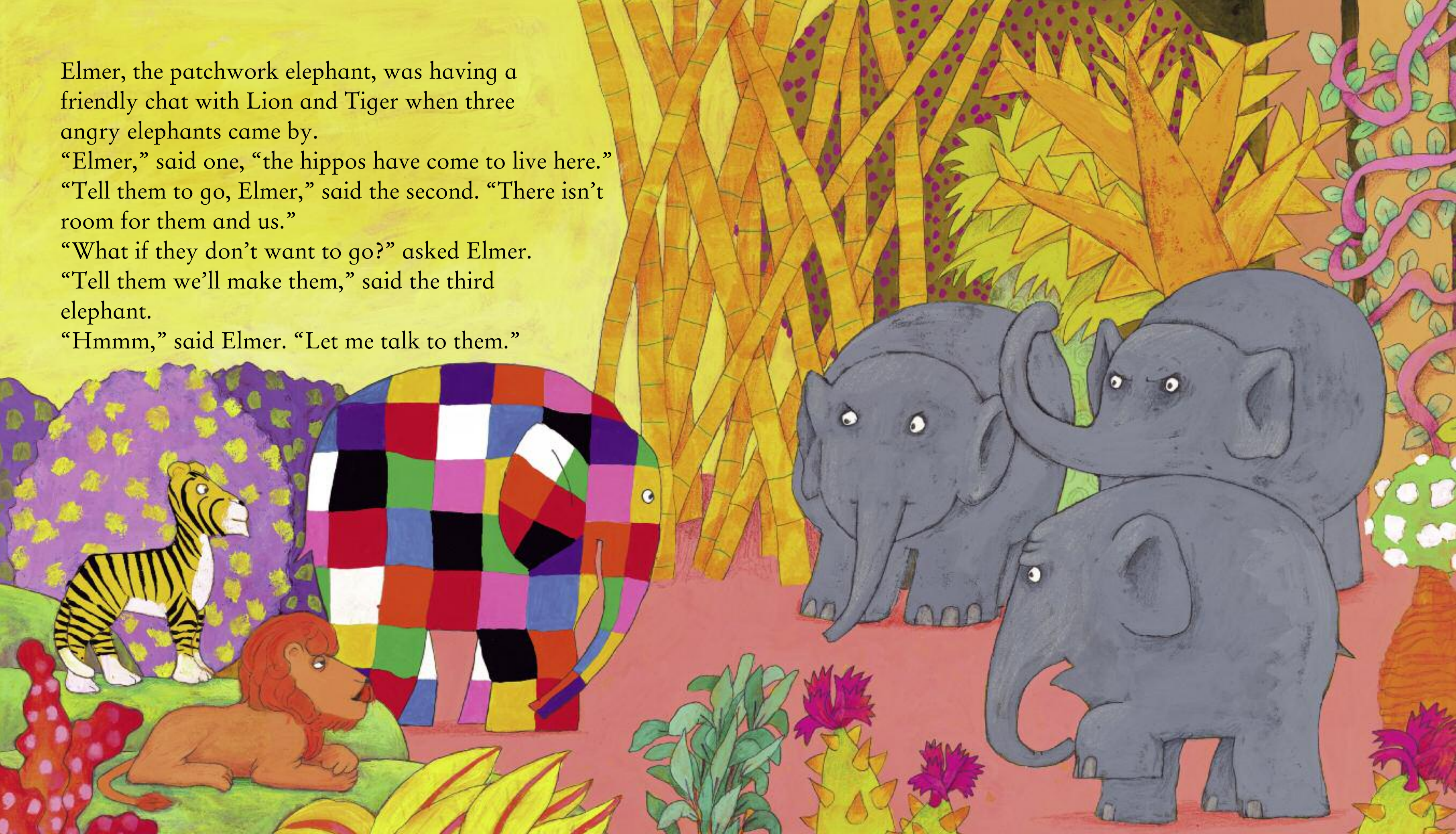
“Elmer,” said one, “the hippos have come to live here.”

“Tell them to go, Elmer,” said the second. “There isn’t room for them and us.”

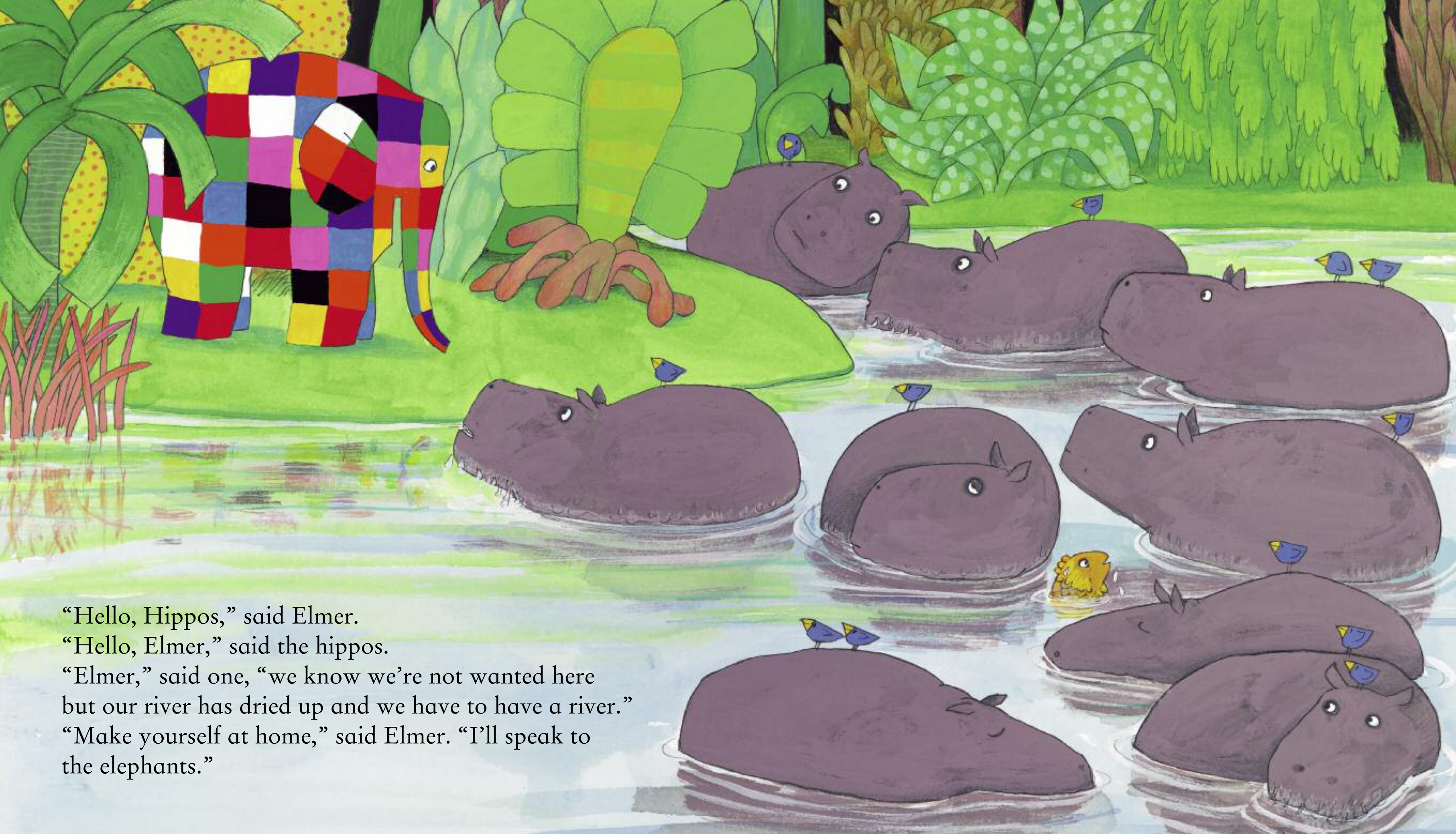
“What if they don’t want to go?” asked Elmer.

“Hmmm,” said Elmer. “Let me talk to them.”







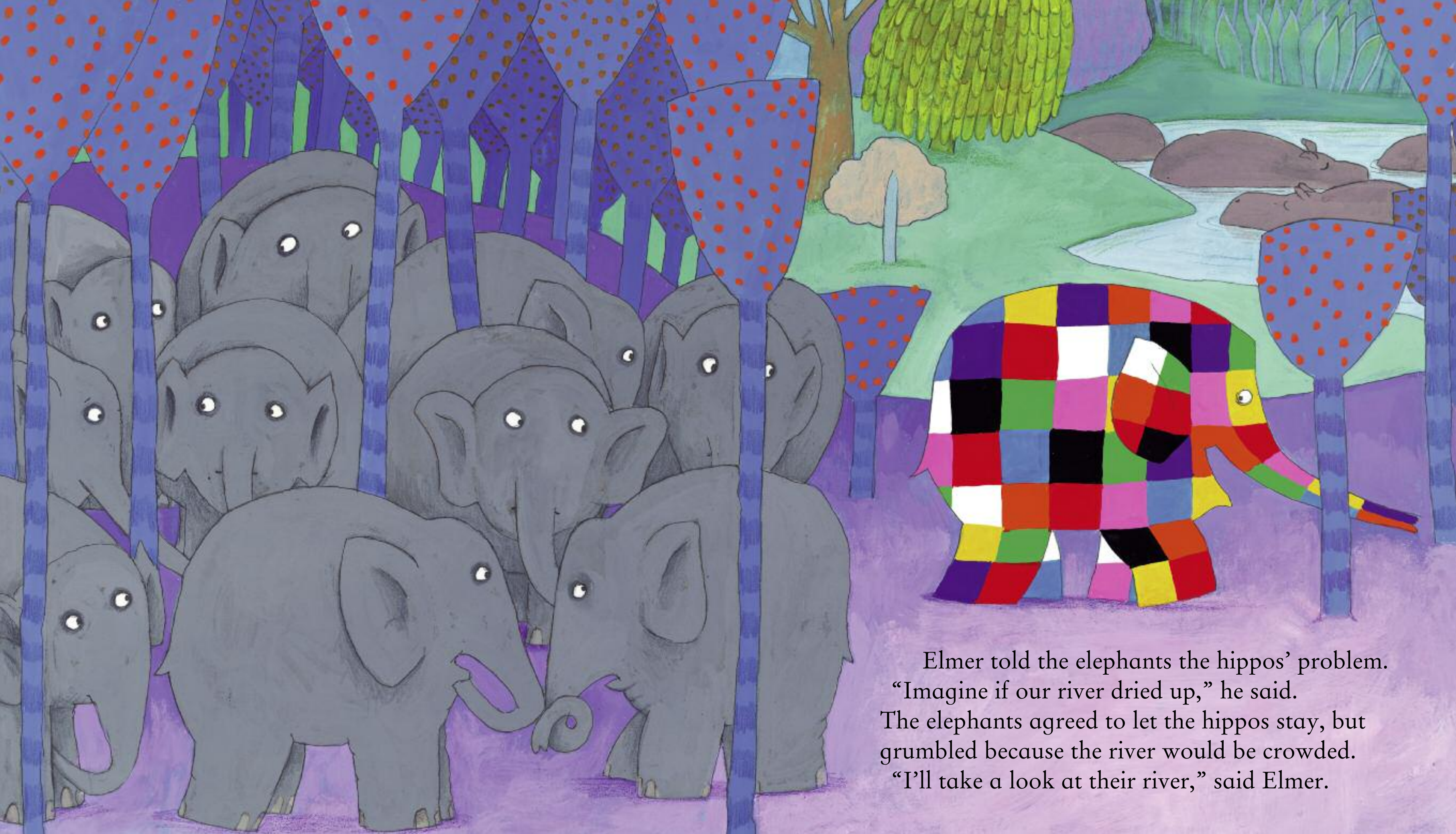
“Hello, Hippos,” said Elmer.
