Elizabeth was third in line to the throne behind her uncle, Edward, Prince of Wales, and her father.

Elizabeth was born at 2.40am on 21 April 1926 in London, the first child of the Duke and Duchess of York. She was given the name Elizabeth Alexandra Mary.
