is for **Bobby**

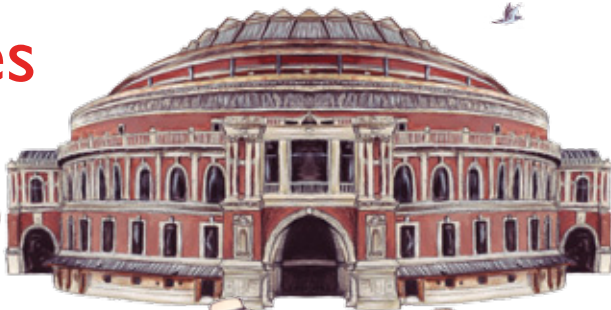


Hickory dickory dock, a flock of starlings stopped the clock. They landed on the minute hand of Big Ben in 1945 and moved it back by five minutes.

The world's oldest underground railway was opened in 1863 and is known as the Tube. Around 80,000 umbrellas are lost each year on the trains.

King John kept lions and bears at the Tower of London in 1204. The animals were finally moved to London Zoo in 1831.



London Zoo was the first scientific Zoo. It was founded by Sir Stamford Raffles, who is better known for founding Singapore (the Lion City).
