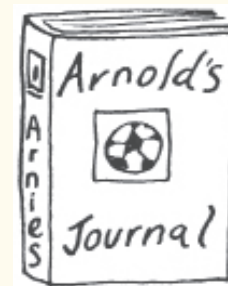
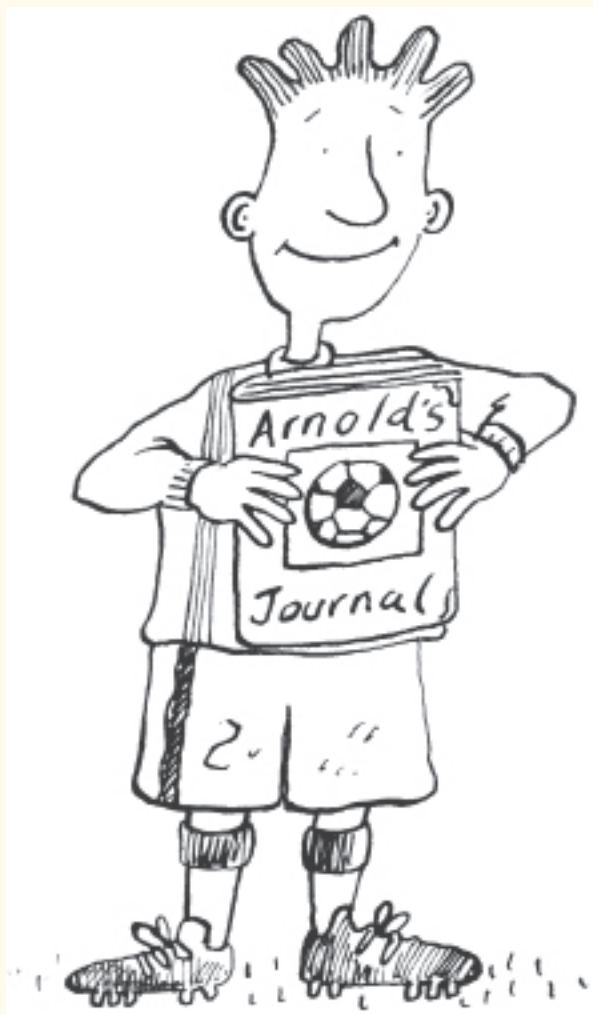

European Champions League Final,” he said to

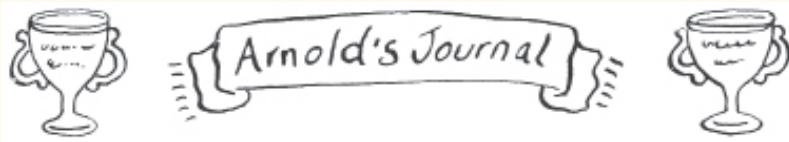


me after we won the semi-final. (See number

## My top five sub stats:



1. Keith Peacock was the first ever substitute to play in the English League when he came on for Charlton Athletic against Bolton in August 1965. Before

that season, substitutes were not allowed.

2. David Fairclough, who played for Liverpool from 1975–1983, was nicknamed “Super Sub” because he came off the bench to score so often.



3. Ammoniaci came on as a sub for the Italian club Lazio in a Serie A game against Roma in 1979. He was sent off before he'd even touched the ball!

4. Laszlo Kiss is the only substitute to have scored a hat-trick in the World Cup Finals. He did it for Hungary against El Salvador in 1982, when he scored after 70, 74 and 77 minutes – the fastest hat-trick in World Cup history.



5. Manchester United beat Bayern Munich 2–1 to win the European Champions League Final in 1999. Their two goals were both scored by subs: Ole Gunnar Solskjaer and Teddy Sheringham.
