Dr. Dee, the Supposed Modern Wizard :

Dr. John Dee, the so-called English wizard, is often thought to be the model for Dr. Faustus, the wizard who made a pact with an evil spirit named Mephistopheles. Dr. Faustus sold his soul for a paltry twenty-four years of earthly power. Dr. Dee has not been so foolish. And while it is true that he performs many strange experiments using a crystal ball, or shew-stone, in

which he claims his assistant Kelly talks to so-called Enochian spirits, he is usually more interested in mundane studies such as cartography, and he has spent time studying under the famous mapmaker Mercator. Although he has an impressive library of extraordinarily erudite magical books, including the fabled *Liber Mysteriorum*, he is not really a true wizard.

The German philosopher Cornelius Agrippa had many professions, and wrote a book on wizardology entitled, 'Occult Philosophy'. PARACELUSUS

Paracelsus, a Swiss alchemist, was said to be a wizard, and there is a story that he actually obtained a genuine piece of the Philosopher's Stone in Constantinople. In reality, though, he spent far more time investigating the properties of minerals, and devising better ways of mining them and, as a physician, of studying the human body in order to find out if there were a better way of curing the many ailments that it could fall victim to.



☞ BROOMSTICKS ☞

Broomsticks are not often used by wizards, as they can be uncomfortable to ride, either forwards or backwards. If you are able to afford it, I would recommend one of the more luxurious and civilised methods of flight such as a flying carpet.



☞ FLYING OINTMENT ☞

I have never seen a good recipe for flying ointment: most contain noxious substances and almost all are poisonous. In fact, many such ointments, sold by charlatans, cause the user to fall fast asleep and merely dream about flying.

CHAPTER VIII: MAGICAL FLIGHT & FLYING CARPETS.

For many years humans have dreamt of being able to fly like birds, winged insects and dragons.

For many more, wizards have been able to perform just that feat, using a number of different methods.

NONE THING THAT is known to very few non-wizards is that all of the various methods of flying—by broomstick, flying carpet or seven-league boots—use the same spell. The chief ingredient in this spell is a phoenix feather. For six hours, hold the feather above the object to be charmed, think about flying and repeat the words, "UP, UP AND AWAY!" over and over again. Now, fix the feather to the charmed object. You will be able to bid the object to fly by uttering the command, "ALTHIELO!" When you are airborne, it is important to remember that you are actually being carried by invisible fairies, so do not say or do anything to upset them, as they might decide to drop you.

In general, silk carpets from Persia travel the fastest, as they offer the least resistance to the wind.

☞ LEVITATION ☞
 Levitation is in fact a type of illusion, rather than real magic. Can you see how the conjuror shown in this picture is managing to levitate? No? Then he has obviously managed to fool you.



Rules of Flight

- ☞ Fly high enough so that you cannot be seen from the ground, thus avoiding frightening the uninitiated.
- ☞ Smaller flying objects must always give way to larger ones, by taking a lower course.
- ☞ Try to take off and land in an inconspicuous area, so that you remain secret and concealed.
- ☞ Never lend a magical carpet, or broomstick to someone else. Protect them magically, so that others will not be able to use them.
- ☞ Show courtesy in all matters involving flight. Never use your ability to fly as an excuse to show off your magical prowess.

Flying Carpets:
 The Arabian book *The Thousand and One Nights* includes the story of Prince Houssain, who discovered a flying carpet. As it was a silk carpet of very high quality, it was able to travel very quickly. A carpet is valued by the number of knots that have been used to make it. The greater the number of knots in a carpet's weave, the greater the number of knots of speed it can achieve as it flies.

Leonardo da Vinci & Scientific Flight:
 The unmagical often tinker with attempts to devise mechanical means of flight. Even the great inventor Leonardo da Vinci included designs for one such machine in his notebooks. While fools may laugh, the apprentice ought to bear in mind that these experiments are sure to bear fruit sooner or later. However, as wizards, we will always find wizardological flight more efficient and satisfying.
