

"What do you mean, we do nothing at all?" said the other.


"Why you ridiculous creatures, you wouldn't be here if it wasn't for us! Thieves would steal you, wolves would eat you!" said the first dog.


"In fact," said both dogs together, "if we were not here, you would be too terrified even to come out to graze!"
