Farmyard families

In the spring, many farmers are busy helping their animals produce their young. Do you know the names for all these farm animals and their babies?

Hens and chicks

A broody hen sits on its eggs for 21 days before the chicks hatch out.



Nannies and kids Kids can be born

all year round. The mother, or nanny, often has two or three at a time.



Cows and calves

Most calves are born in the spring. It is very unusual for a cow to have more than one calf.



Mares and foals

A foal is able to stand up and run around within hours of being born.



Sows and piglets

The mother pig, or sow, can have as many as 14 piglets in one litter.

What's that noise?

Farms can be noisy places, and farmers need to know what their animals' sounds mean.

Sheep

Sheep go baa, while lambs bleat. Sheep can also grunt and make other noises.

Donkeys

Male donkeys (jacks) are more noisy than female ones (jennies).



These creatures are often noisy when they are hungry or thirsty.

Cows

Cows are usually quiet unless they are unhappy about something.

Cockerels

Many farms have cockerels which crow all day from sunrise to sunset.
